

The Fault in Our Stars

Every day a different body. Every day a different life. There's never any warning about where it will be or who it will be. A has made peace with that, even established guidelines by which


to live: Never get too attached. Avoid being noticed. Do not interfere.






people with Noa's talents on his team. But what Noa and Peter don't realize is that Noa holds the key to a terrible secret.

by Lauren Myracle


