
(Step 3 in the BIG 6 research process: Finding What You Need)

PURPOSE: This activity exposes you to many different electronic resources called databases. When you are gathering information, it may be better to use databases or online indexes instead of traditional search engines such as Google.

Databases or online indexes provide these benefits:

- 1. Information may be found quicker and easier because of how it is organized.
- 2. Information may be more accurate and reliable because it comes from sources that have evaluated and authenticated.





MATERIALS:

- 1. This paper, obviously!
- 2. Writing utensil
- 3. Working internet connection/computer (you may have to share)
- 4. Activity sheet (either separate or at the end of this oacket)
- 5. Your brain shifted into search, find and evaluate mode

PREVIEW: Look at how you can access these informational tools from any computer, even if you are not at school.



1. First go to fcps.org, the Frederick County Public School's homepage.

- 2. Then click on FAMILIES and STUDENTS in the Contents menu bar on the left.
- 3. Then click on RESEARCH PORTALS in the Contents menu bar on the left.

This page is important because it will also provide you with access to your library's print collection: books, encyclopedias, etc. But you will only be able to see the listings, not the actual text. Clicking in the title "You See More," will allow you to search school libraries to materials you may want to check out later.

<u>SIRS Discoverer</u> is a general reference database for children grades 1-9 with full-text articles and images. Features include activities such as science experiments, craft projects, writing activities, biographies of every U.S. President and other notable people, fiction articles, and country facts. <u>Discoverer WebFind</u> is a database of carefully chosen Internet resources on almost any subject appropriate for researchers in grades. <u>Online</u> tutorial available.



<u>SIRS Knowledge Source</u> is a collection of 6 databases for students in grade 6-12. Full-text articles, graphics, photographs, government documents, primary sources, ebooks, and previewed websites.



Thomson Gale's <u>Student Resource Center</u> contain magazine and newspaper articles, primary source documents, multimedia content, and the Gale "Discovering", "Exploring", and "Junior Reference" series.



Also from Thomson Gale researching science topics has never been easier with <u>Science</u> Resource Center.





RATIONALE:

I actually have an introduction lesson of getting to the database portal and then activity I, which focuses on SIRS and compares it to Google. There would be two more lessons exploring the other databases and features on our FCPS portal page. I decided to start with SIRS because it offers a lot of variety and accesses smaller databases within. I would also want to assess prior knowledge of SIRS as some teachers in elementary and middle school rely heavily on this database. SIRS is easy to move around in, but does contain features that be easily overlooked, such as the lexile, tagging, and topic browsing, all tools that can help make the information gathering process much easier, and which Google doesn't really have. Of course SIRS also is more trustworthy and less overwhelming with its number of results, something students clearly see when they compare the "number of hits" between the two.
